## Sixth Form Open Evening 2023



On Wednesday 22nd November we held our annual Kings Langley Sixth Form Open Evening. This year we saw a record number of attendees and within minutes of the evening closing, we received a large number of applications both from our own Yr11 students as well as a large number of applications from external students. Following the long weekend, we returned on Monday with 73 applications from our own Yr11 students and 52 from external students. The rapid response and amount of applications being received is a sign that Kings Langley Sixth Form is clearly becoming the first choice for post-16 education for young people from not only Kings Langley, but much further afield.

So what is it that interests our prospective students? Feedback from visitors to our open evening highlight how young people and their families were able to feel the mature and welcoming culture we have in our Sixth Form, alongside how we prioritise education excellence whilst developing the whole student. Students visiting us from selective and grammar schools commented on the exciting and diverse provision we have and how this can not be matched by other Sixth Forms or colleges.

Applications for September 2024 are now open with our initial deadline of Friday 15th December. To ensure we can construct our subject blocks that meet as many preferences as possible, we advise our students to submit their application by this deadline. # Student Perspectives

The start of my sixth form journey has been challenging. I have faced academic burnout in a new environment with more responsibilities and none of my old friends from secondary school, alongside mental health issues such as dyslexia, autism, anxiety and depression. However, although it has been difficult, the sixth form team at Kings Langley Sixth Form have supported me throughout.

I have been able to adjust to the new changes and daily challenges with the help of the Sixth Form pastoral support team, which have created a safe space for me and many other students, it's not just the bean bags, live plants and stress balls, but the teachers, Mrs Battaglia, Mr Tubb, Mr Scott, and Miss Allan who have that made me feel comfortable and understood.

I have been welcomed and supported as an adult and in a non-judgmental way. They are there to talk about everything from academic life, to complicated home life relationships and navigate tricky waters with a variety of options and alternative pathways and options available to overcome those issues.

I have been empowered by this sixth form in a way I can take control of my life currently with study techniques and mental health management, but also my life after sixth form with future careers advice, decision making and even basic life skills like how to wash your clothes - thank you Mr Tubb! The Sixth Form has allowed me to flourish as a person although I have had to face a lot of challenges so far.

Whilst the decision of what I wanted to do after receiving my GCSE results was a difficult one to make, I'm glad that I settled on staying at Kings Langley Sixth Form. The new Sixth Form building that opened this year is a real highlight of KLSix; it provides a dedicated working and social space for all students, and allows for a sense of independence from the lower school. ### **Character: Olivia Strong; Founder of “Run for Heros”**

Millions of healthcare workers lost their lives fighting the Covid-19 pandemic. A resident of the United Kingdom, Olivia Strong, decided to help the healthcare workers by raising a fund of 5,000 Euros through a campaign named ‘Run for Heroes,’ but little did she know that she would end up raising the fund over £5 million. According to the then lockdown rules of the U.K government, people were allowed to leave their homes only for the essential work and for one daily exercise. Strong thought of utilising this liberty of one form as exercise through her campaign. She said, *“If we combine our one form of exercise a day that we’re currently getting because everyone’s out running anyway, then maybe we can make a difference.”*



The tagline of her campaign ‘Run for Heroes’ was ‘run, donate, nominate.’ In this campaign, the participant had to run, walk, or cycle 5 km, and donate 5 Euros, and then they had to nominate five more people to repeat this act. Nearly eight hundred thousand people participated in this campaign and the raised 5 million Euros was donated to ‘NHS Charities Together’ for the U.K healthcare workers fighting against the Covid-19.

# Equality and Diversity

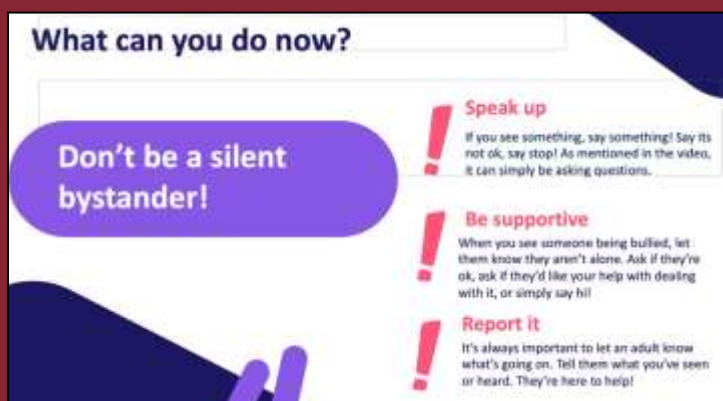
This week representatives from our three Equality and Diversity student leadership groups have been delivering assemblies on the importance of celebrating diversity in our community, what is meant by Protected Characteristics and the difference between banter and bullying.



As November was Anti-bullying month, the students took the opportunity to remind their peers to not be a silent bystander if they see anything or unkind, hurtful or jokes being made about any protected characteristics.



“We are not saying that we can’t joke with friends, but we are encouraging everyone to be mindful of how, sometimes, these jokes may not be received as they were intended. ‘Banter’ is not hurtful by its definition and if something being called ‘banter’ is hurting someone, it’s no longer ‘banter’ but hurtful behaviour and potentially bullying.”





# STEM Challenge

## This week's challenge:

There is a barrel with no lid and some juice in it. "This barrel of juice is more than half full," says the woman. "No, it's not," says the man. "It's less than half full." Without any measuring implements and without removing any juice from the barrel, how can they easily determine who is correct?

## Last week's challenge:

Three men are lined up behind each other. The tallest man is in the back and can see the heads of the two in front of him; the middle man can see the one man in front of him; the man in front can't see anyone. They are blindfolded and hats are placed on their heads, picked from three black hats and two white hats. The extra two hats are hidden and the blindfolds removed. The tallest man is asked if he knows what colour hat he's wearing; he doesn't. The middle man is asked if he knows; he doesn't. But the man in front, who can't see anyone, says he knows. How does he know, and what colour hat is he wearing?

Answer:

Black. The man in front knew he and the middle man aren't both wearing white hats or the man in the back would have known he had a black hat (since there are only two white hats). The man in front also knows the middle man didn't see him with a white hat because if he did, based on the tallest man's answer, the middle man would have known he himself was wearing a black hat. So, the man in front knows his hat must be black.

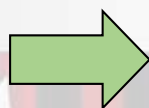

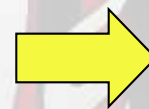

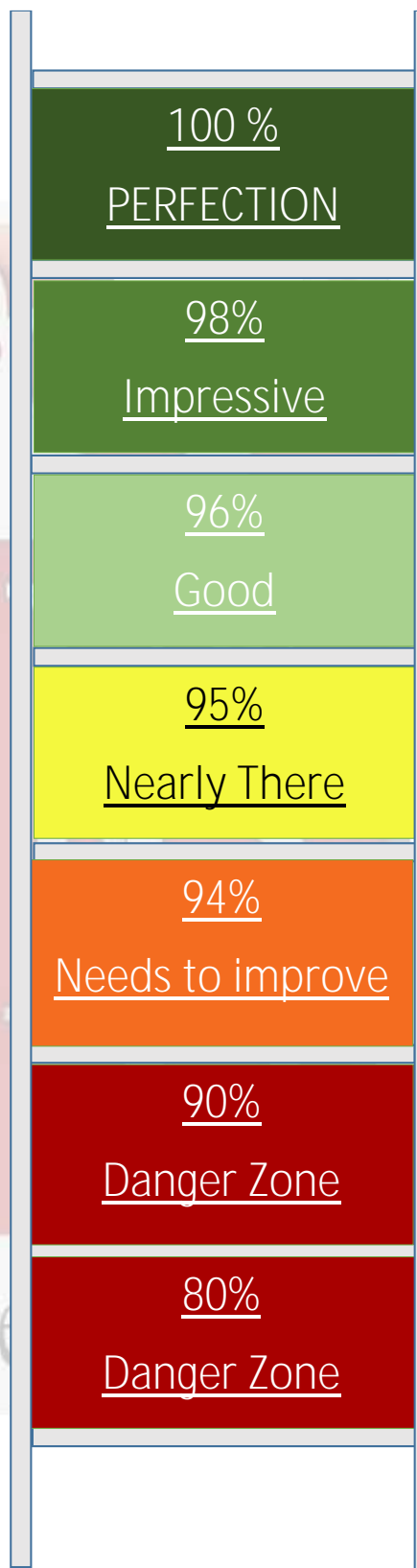
