Kings Langley School - Online Subject Curriculum Resources

We would like to share with you where you can support your child in accessing resources for the curriculum taught at school. We have made updates to our Microsoft 365 platform to allow greater ease when finding and locating the resources used in lessons and for revision. We share the belief that to 'Unlock our potential', all young people should be empowered to take ownership of their learning independently. As such the school curriculum resources are now easily available for students to access; to go over work, review/revise material or catch up on missed lessons through absence.

Please read through short steps for students to be able to access the content from their lessons through MS Teams. For example, in the event that a lesson is missed you and your child can access the content of the lesson at an alternative time.




- Using this link https://account.microsoft.com/account/manage-my-account ask your child to log into their Microsoft Account using their school email e.g

5. Once your class Team is open click on the resources tab at the top.







TOOLED UP

BECAUSE EVIDENCE MATTERS

It is National Eating Disorder Week here in the UK. This is a great opportunity to consider anything we can do to prevent children developing disordered eating thoughts and behaviours. Today's children are growing up in a world where perfectionism is highly rated and curated (particularly on social media) and body dissatisfaction is one of the biggest predictors of eating disorders.

Early intervention tips include: family emphasis on body appreciation or gratitude (a focus on what our bodies can do for us, rather than on what they look like), modelling kindness towards ourselves when we look in the mirror, and focusing on emotional literacy within family life.

Parents need to be aware of the impact of appearance-based social media. Dr Kathy Weston reflected on this in a previous <u>Wednesday Wisdom</u> which contains vital insights for all parents. Tooled Up also hosts webinars from some of the world's leading researchers and clinicians on social media and mental health and eating disorders.

No matter the age of your children, it is important to know some of the protective factors that can reduce the risk of an eating disorder ever developing, and to know that there is support available for you should eating issues arise. Remember early intervention is key and you are not alone.

If you have a young, fussy eater at home and are worrying about that, read some Tooled Up tips authored by a paediatric <u>nutritionist</u>. If you have a child whose sibling is struggling with an eating disorder, we have <u>advice</u> on how they can support their beloved sister or brother. If you have a tween or teen using appearance-based social media, please read through this <u>resource</u> and consider using it to open up dialogues about digital diets and potential unwanted impact on how we feel about ourselves.

If you are a parent who needs hope and inspiration that young people can recover from eating disorders, listen to our podcast with Eva Musby



and read through the accompanying notes.


Trip to the Houses of Parliament

Before half term, some of our most politically-engaged students had the opportunity to visit the Houses of Parliament for the day.

These students had engaged with events during Parliament Week in November and/or submitted entries for the Parliament Week poster competition. This was also an opportunity for our Year 12 Politics students to enrich their understanding of their A Level course.



Students were treated to a guided tour of both the House of Commons and the House of Lords, led by an expert guide from the Parliamentary tours team. Whilst tours usually last around an hour, ours was nearly two hours long, a direct result of the sheer number of questions students had about the role of Parliament and the building itself.



Students were most fascinated by the art installation in Westminster Hall. 'New Dawn' [pictured] by Mary Branson which celebrates the 'tide of change' of the women's suffrage movement. Each lit circle or 'scroll' represents an Act of Parliament which helped to bring about equality, or a campaign group who fought for female suffrage. The installation is linked to the tide of the River Thames, where the number of scrolls lit up is dependent on the rising of the tide.

Students had the most questions for our guide in the Commons itself, wanting to know more about how our MPs discuss and vote on the issues that matter to them most. They had questions about specific MPs as well as the role of the Speaker [one student even noticed the emergency buttons on his chair!] and the importance of the division lobbies.







Many of our History Club students, many had fantastic questions about the depictions of battles and previous monarchs in the state halls, as well as about the history of events in Parliament itself; they saw

where Black Rod announces the Monarch's presence [a reference to the events of 1642 when Charles I attempted to arrest 5 MPs in the House of Commons], as well as the sections of the building which had been rebuilt, looking at odds with the rest of the architecture, as a result of fire and the Blitz. Students also saw the chamber under which the gunpowder plot was discovered; to this day, every time the monarch comes to visit Parliament, the cellar is checked for gunpowder. Students even got to see a section of the original palace that is not usually open to the public!




As is often the case, students were fascinated by the House of Lords, because it is the chamber they know least about. They learned about Lord Bird, who suffered from poverty and

homelessness, then went

on to found the 'Big Issue'; as a result of his charity work and expertise in legislation on this issue, he was appointed to the House of Lords.

A number of students noticed the historic signs that still mark the entrance to the House of Lords, with rules for how unaccompanied women should enter the gallery! Of course, these are no longer in use, but it was a reminder to students of the scale of the barriers to universal suffrage before 1918.





Amongst a number of statues that students saw and discussed on our tour, they were most interested in Queen Victoria's which was built upon her accession. They learned that she didn't actually like it at all because her shoes had been made too big! But it was too late to change before the state opening of Parliament that year; she despised it every time she visited.

Of course, the Parliamentary gift shop was a highlight for many. Some of our returned treasures included a make-you-own House of Commons set, badges and even a Parliamentary tie!


Crucially, students had an enjoyable day learning outside of the classroom and behaved impeccably. Their conduct was faultless throughout the journey into London and the tour. As educators, we strive to increase the extra-curricular opportunities available to our students, and it is the character of our students that enables us to do this without difficulty.

If you aren't able to join us on the evening, then please consider donating a raffle prize.

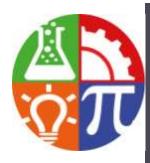


Mort by Terry Pratchett
