Character of the Week

Character Theme For Next Week: Developing Leadership: Self-Regulation and Courage

Our theme for after half term is developing leadership. We are looking how students can demonstrate self-regulation and courage to enable them to further develop their leadership skills. We believe that everyone in the school has the potential to be a leader, in whatever capacity. If they choose not to take up any opportunities we have in school, then so be it but they can still demonstrate good leadership qualities around the building, in lessons and in all their other activities and pursuits. This, however, takes courage – how do you follow your own mind and not the crowd?

Consider simple situations: someone comes out of the supermarket and their shopping bag breaks. Are you the person to run up and help pick up their items from the floor? Or are you the person that pretends you did not see? Or worse still the person who laughs and gets out your phone to film them because everyone else around you is be doing that? How would we want people to react if we were in a similar situation?

Doing something different to everybody else because it is the right thing to do is developing good leadership skills. Role modelling better behaviours, talking in a manner that is appropriate to our surroundings and those people around us, demonstrating good manners and proper curtesy to others, reacting differently and more supportively to negative situations – being the person to step forward and do the right thing are all ways in which we can develop our own leadership. This takes self-regulation and courage and it is extremely difficult if the people we are trying to be is different to our friends. Ultimately it is only a decision you can make for yourself – who do you want to be?

Character of the Week: Jane Austen, author



Born December 16, 1775, Steventon, Hampshire, England—died July 18, 1817, Winchester, Hampshire

Jane Austen is loved mainly as a charming guide to fashionable life in the Regency period. She is admired for portraying a world of elegant houses, dances, servants and fashionable young men driving barouches. But her own vision of her task was radically different. She was an ambitious – and stern

– moralist. She was acutely conscious of human failings and she had a deep desire to make people nicer: less selfish, more reasonable, more dignified and more sensitive to the needs of others.

Born in 1775, Jane Austen grew up in a small village in Hampshire where her father was the Anglican rector. They had quite a high social status but were not at all well-off. She started writing young: at only twentyone she had a novel turned down by a major publisher. During most of her adult life, Britain was at war with Napoleon. Two of her brothers became admirals. She did much of her writing at a tiny octagonal table. She was a very good dancer and very interested in being well-dressed. She was neat, elegant and lively. She never married, though on a couple of occasions she was tempted. Mostly she lived in pleasant small houses in the country with her sister Cassandra. The novel was her chosen weapon in the struggle to reform humanity. She completed six: Northanger Abbey, Pride and Prejudice, Sense and Sensibility, Mansfield Park, Emma, and Persuasion.





Drama News

On Thursday 13th October we took over 60 students in GCSE Drama to see **The Woman in Black** at the Fortune theatre, London. This long running show is perfect for drama students to study, not only the performance skills of the actors, but also the theatrical design. The ability of the costume, sound, lighting and set designers to transport an audience in a very intimate theatre to the location of this classic ghost story is an excellent example of how important design is in theatre. This is why throughout Key stage 3 and beyond we encourage students to explore technical theatre. Both year 8 and year 9 drama students will be looking in detail at design in their lessons next term.

Last weeks Answer:


The water level in a reservoir is low, but doubles every day. It takes 60 days to fill the reservoir. How long does it take for the reservoir to become half full?

Answer: 59 days. If the water level doubles every day, the reservoir on any given day was half the size the day prior. If the


reservoir is full on day 60, that means it was half full on day 59, not on day 30.
