

The competition involves a team of students taking on the roles of magistrates, lawyers, witnesses and court staff to prepare a specially written case. We are delighted to invite parents to Stevenage Magistrates' Courts on the 18th of March (from 10.00 to 1.30 pm) where a group of our Year 8 students will be competing against other schools in Hertfordshire.

Finally, every day I am delighted with how the vast majority of young people at the school display and support our values. Unfortunately, there is a small group of young people who are not adhering to our values. They are clearly being influenced by external factors such as social media or peer pressure and as such we are now planning on how to address this with them and their families due to the new challenges they and in some cases, their families bring to our school community.

Please can I ask all parents to explain the importance of school, the opportunities we offer to ensure young people engage with these and finally the school values and how they can adhere and support them in their development.

Character of the Week

As a school of character, we feel it is important to encourage our students to be empathetic and look to support the people around them. To this end, we encouraged our students to take part in Well-Being Wednesday. We gave them a list of example tasks that they could complete, allocating points for each one achieved during the day. Activities that involved helping others, rather than just oneself purposely received a higher amount of points. Parents were asked to complete the questionnaire at the end of Wednesday to feedback all the wonderful things their children have done, and to allow us to recognise their contributions to others. MFL News

La Casa de Bernarda Alba" is a play written by the Spanish dramatist Federico García Lorca, just two months before his death in the Spanish Civil War. It depicts the drama of women in the villages of Spain where Bernarda Alba is a widow who obliges her five daughters to grieve for eight years in the 20th century Andalusia.

This play is part of the Spanish A level Literature Exam and when I saw that they were performing it at the Cervantes Theatre in London, I thought immediately of taking my Y13 students there. We studied the play in so much details and therefore, what a great live way to revise for their Spanish A level upcoming exams.

A would like to say thank to our wonderful Spanish assistant lone who wanted to say the following:

"From my point of view, studying this play at school is very important because, in this way, students can learn about Spanish literature as well as about the culture of the 20s in Spain, its traditions, Spanish expressions, metaphors, idioms, new vocabulary... and at the same time they can enjoy the plot of the play. I found it a very satisfying experience, as the students had already read the book and it was great that they could actually see it being performed".





Auschwitz Visit by Megan 12LIY

Please be aware the following may include some upsetting information for young readers.

I've recently participated in lessons from Auschwitz in which I attended an orientation seminar to introduce me to what I was expecting, went on a one-day visit to Auschwitz-Birkenau in Poland on the 21st of the February and then a follow up seminar.

For those who aren't aware of what the Holocaust was, the Holocaust was the murder of approximately six million Jewish men, women and children by Nazi Germany and its collaborators during the Second World War. Auschwitz was the largest of the German Nazi concentration camps, where Jewish people lived and were tortured.

On my online orientation seminar, we had group discussions on images taken around the time of the holocaust and the impact of what they represented. I also learnt some new terms which I wasn't aware of such as "untermensch" which was used to describe Jewish people as sub-human, which showed me more of the decimation Jewish people faced on top of the executions. I believe this orientation prepared me for the kind of things I would learn and experience in Poland.

My one-day visit to Auschwitz itself began on the grounds of the remains of the Great Synagogue. The Great Synagogue in Oswiecim was, until World War 2, the largest Synagogue in the town but was destroyed in 1939. I learnt it was knocked down numerous times but was built back even bigger each time, and eventually was never re built. One thing that shocked me was how they were still finding items buried 65 years ago to this day, and were even digging for these artefacts on my visit. I think this being the first place we visited was very important to see where it all began. Later on in the day, I went on a tour through a gas chamber which really left me shocked. I was able to gain a small insight into the conditions which Jewish people experienced, and how the event should be remembered so it never happens again. The final site we visited was a concentration camp, where we took a walk around the grounds.



One thing I remember hearing was that someone was tired, and their feet hurt from walking so far but they quickly realised they had complained about something so small, and they were most likely standing in the exact spot a human being went through a large amount of pain and torture. This really makes you think about how we are lucky we never have to experience this and should do everything in our power to make sure it doesn't happen in our future.

Finally, after returning from Poland, we had our follow up seminar. In this seminar we heard from a survivor. We listened to her struggles and her losses, which humanised the victims of the Holocaust by showing every person, every family, and every community had a life of their own before the Holocaust. Also, simply using statistics to define the Holocaust doesn't do survivors justice. This whole experience aided in my understanding of the event, developing it even further than what I learnt in school. These are some images I took on the day:











