Over the last term and for the remainder of this term, a selected group of students have been working on an extended project focused on sustainable tourism. As part of The Brilliant Club, the students commenced the project by visiting the University of Cambridge before taking part in a series of seminars and tutorials about tourism's sustainability. They carefully considered its economical, ecological and cultural impact on both visitors and host regions. For the last 6 weeks, our students have been working on their dissertations, showcasing their knowledge about a country or city of their choosing, researching and developing their evaluative skills to be able to judge how sustainable tourism is in the area of their choosing. This has been a real opportunity for our students to be exposed to University style teaching and expectations, as well as having the opportunity to nurture their own independence. They have become experts in an in-depth case study and now look forward to the final amendments before their submission. Students will be attending a graduation event later in February to celebrate their tremendous hard work; we look forward to celebrating with them as we are so proud of them.










Character of the Week

Character Theme For Next Week: Tolerance and Co-operation

This week and next week our assemblies are focusing on tackling prejudice, with a particular focus of anti-Semitisms and Islamophobia. As a school we have been working very hard on challenging intolerance whether it is spoken word or action. Whilst sanctions are appropriate, it is also important that we teach students about the meanings of words or how certain actions are perceived.

The work of some of our student leaders, particularly the students involved in the Bold Voices group have been helping students that have made prejudicial comments by meeting with them. As part of the meeting the students discuss the meanings of words used and discuss what types of impact these words have. More often than not, these discussions have a larger impression than sanctions or conversations with teachers, as students realise this is not "a school thing" – it is a bigger picture, and one that their peers believe is extremely important.

We are asking all students to report acts of intolerance whether it is linked to race, gender, age, religion etc. as it is important that we understand where our students need further teaching and support in making changes to their intolerant behaviours.

Character of the Week: Alfred Dreyfus, Jewish artillery captain (1850-1935)



A scandal that rocked France in the late 19th and early 20th centuries, the Dreyfus affair involved a Jewish artillery captain in the French army, Alfred Dreyfus (1859-1935), who was falsely convicted of passing military secrets to the Germans. In 1894, after a French spy at the German Embassy in Paris discovered a ripped-up letter in a waste basket with handwriting said to resemble that of Dreyfus, he was court-martialled, found

guilty of treason and sentenced to life behind bars on Devil's Island off of French Guiana. In a public ceremony in Paris following his conviction, Dreyfus had the insignia torn from his uniform and his sword broken and was paraded before a crowd that shouted, "Death to Judas, death to the Jew."

In 1896, the new head of the army's intelligence unit, Georges Picquart, uncovered evidence pointing to another French military officer, Major Ferdinand Walsin Esterhazy, as the real traitor. However, when Picquart told his bosses what he'd discovered he was discouraged from continuing his investigation, transferred to North Africa and later imprisoned. Nevertheless, word about Esterhazy's possible guilt began to circulate. In 1898, he was court-martialled but quickly found not guilty; he later fled the country. After Esterhazy's acquittal, a French newspaper published an open letter titled "J'Accuse…!" by well-known author Emile Zola in which he defended Dreyfus and accused the military of a major cover-up in the case. As a result, Zola was convicted of libel, although he escaped to England and later managed to return to France.

The Dreyfus affair deeply divided France, not just over the fate of the man at its centre but also over a range of issues, including politics, religion and national identity. In 1899, Dreyfus was -martialled for a second time and found guilty. Although he pardoned days later by the French president, it wasn't until that Dreyfus officially was exonerated and reinstated in the army.

What makes this number unique?

Answer next week.

Last term's answer:

You are in a cookie factory, and need to make a huge batch of chocolate chip cookies. The recipe calls for exactly 4 cups of sugar. Problem is that you have two buckets. One bucket holds 5 cups, the other 3 cups. Using these buckets, how can you measure exactly 4 cups of sugar?



Answer:

This is possible, and there are two ways to do it: Solution 1: Fill the 3-cup bucket and pour it into the 5-cup bucket. Fill the 3-cup bucket again, and pour it into the 5-cup bucket until the 5-cup bucket is full. That will leave exactly 1 cup of sugar in the 3 -cup bucket. Dump out the 5-cup bucket, and dump the 1 cup from the 3-cup bucket into the empty 5-cup bucket.

This leaves 1 cup in the 5-cup bucket.


Now fill the 3-cup bucket again and add it to the 5-cup bucket. Now you have exactly 4 cups of sugar in the 5-cup bucket! Solution 2: Fill the 5-cup bucket. Pour it into the 3-cup bucket. This leaves 2 cups in the 5-cup bucket. Dump out the 3-cup bucket. Now pour the 2 cups from the 5 cup into the 3 cup. Refill the 5 cup. Now pour the 5 cup into the 3 cup until the 3 cup is full. That will leave exactly 4 cups in the 5-cup bucket!




Books of the Month
