Progress over Easter continues with our building programme and parents dropping off each morning can clearly see our new Sixth Form and Community Centre taking shape with the roof beams going on over Easter and now the roof is starting to be completed. We have bi-weekly meetings with the contractor and as such we remain confident now the weather has improved that it will be completed by the end of the summer term. This will allow our team time to ensure the fit out is completed over the summer holidays to open in September.





Finally, we have had some better weather and as such we are able to open up our school fields this week. The sense of pleasure I get from this cannot be underestimated as it creates a real sense of space in the school for young people. The all-weather surface which we are hopeful will enable us to have this sense of space all year round. As mentioned in previous newsletters planning permission is now granted and an agreed contractor in place and we remain hopeful we will open this full-size facility in January 2024. As we open our field to create some space, we will remind students who suffer from allergies, such as hay fever that the indoor spaces such as the main hall remain open as a space for them to take a break during the hay fever season. I would like to remind parents that as we move into the summer months, please ensure your child attends school with a water bottle to refill during the day and sun cream to apply or reapply when necessary.

No Idling

I would like to remind our community about "Idling when waiting in your car". We would like to ask for your support in helping to improve air quality when waiting on the school site or on the roads in the vicinity of the school, therefore please can we ask vehicle owners to turn their engines off whilst they wait. If you are going to be waiting in your car for more than 30 seconds, please remember to turn your car's engine off. You will not only improve our air, you will also save money in fuel and vehicle wear and tear costs!

Why should you support 'No Idling'?

Idling harms our health: vehicle exhaust fumes are damaging to everyone's health, but it especially affects children, who breathe more and at a faster rate than adults. By turning off your engine, you can improve the quality of air students, parents and staff and the wider community breathe. Idling pollutes the air we breathe: an idling engine produces unnecessary pollution and can produce up to twice as many exhaust emissions as an engine in motion. By not idling, you reduce the level of harmful emissions being released into the atmosphere. Keep money in your wallet and save fuel: despite the popular story that idling your car uses less fuel than turning it off and restarting – idling actually costs you money. It is more fuel efficient to turn off your engine if you are going to be sitting more than 30 seconds and this will also reduce the wear and tear on your engine.



You can help reduce air pollution around the school by doing the following:

- Turn off your engine when dropping off or picking up from school.
- Take up cycling and walk where you can, or think about choosing public transport. over using your car.
- Share car journeys where possible.
- Drop your child further away from the school and encourage them to walk the last part of the journey, which helps to lessen the environmental impact during the very busy period around the local area at drop off and collection times.

Together, we can make a real difference and improve the quality of air we all breathe.

SOCS

To all parents and carers, with the introduction of our new software SOCS, we encourage all parents to log in and create a new account. SOCS is a safeguarding tool that enables the School to monitor where the pupil is and the activities that they are participating in. As previously communicated, if you do not have a SOCS login, you will not be able to attend a trip/activity.

Magistrates Mock Trial Competition

On Saturday the 25th March 2023, I and eight other students (Joseph 8P, Daniel 8C, Elina 8J, Karina 8J, Paige 8P, Zoha 8P, Olivia 8G and Ella 8P) travelled to the Stevenage Magistrates' Court for a Magistrates' competition between us and four other schools.



During the competition, the prosecution side from one school would compete against the defence side of another school. The other half of both teams (both defence and prosecution) would act as magistrates for the trial. Each person would be scored out of ten, and so the school with the most points in total would win. Simple.

At the beginning of the first trial, the prosecuting side of Kings Langley went against the defence side of Sir John Lawes School. I can testify that everyone was nervous (in other words panic-stricken) when their turn to stand and speak came. The trial went smoothly, and we were all pleased with our performance. After approximately ten minutes, the magistrates re-entered, and the head magistrate declared that the defendant was not guilty. This was followed by an explanation of what the sentence would have been, had the defendant been found guilty – 6 months to 1 year and 6 months.

The first trial was followed by a lunch break, in which nothing much occurred. We were ushered into the next courtroom for the second trial. During this, the defence side of our school competed against the prosecution side of the Nobel school. Yet again, the prosecution and the defence from the previous trial acted as magistrates. Our school did significantly better in this trial, and the verdict was in our favour; not guilty. Again, they went through the possible sentences if the defendant was found guilty.

At the conclusion of this trial, all four schools gathered in the first courtroom for the winning school to be named: Sir John Lawes School. It was a wonderful experience for everyone who took part in this year's Magistrates' competition and, we are all looking forward to doing it again next year!




