I have been teaching for the past 20 years – predominantly as a PE and geography teacher – and have worked in several schools in and around London. As a result, I tend to get a feel for a school very quickly, in terms of the ethos and culture. Even during my interview I liked the feel of Kings Langley School and was therefore delighted when Mr Fisher offered me the job.

I had the pleasure of taking the whole school assemblies last week and spoke to every student between Years 7 – 13 about my expectations and what specifically I was looking for at Kings Langley School.

I want for every student to be happy and to flourish without putting hurdles in their own path along the way. If students know what to expect from me and what to demonstrate in terms of their conduct, there is a much greater chance of this happening. As a parent of three boys (aged 7, 9 and 12), I thought you would like to be aware of what I said to the students during my assemblies.

I want to initially focus on the basics and create a platform on which students can progress and fulfil their potential. My main focus areas are:

- Behaviour: Polite, respectful, well-mannered language and actions at all times.
- **Uniform:** Immaculate standards of dress at all times. The KLS uniform being worn with pride (school shoes, shirts tucked in, ties and top buttons done up correctly, skirts of an appropriate length, blazers on and sleeves not rolled up).
- **Equipment:** All essential equipment being brought to school every day so that students can fully access lessons.
- Punctuality: On time to every lesson so learning is maximised.

As you may be aware, the GCSE and A-Level results for 2022 (summer just gone) were very positive indeed – meaning that the students created future choices for themselves in terms of their next steps. I want to work with everyone at Kings Langley School to ensure that the same is true for your children.

If the four foundations outlined above are met on a daily basis, I am confident that your child will be very happy and very successful. For this reason I know that I can count on your support to make this a reality.

As previously stated, I have already met some wonderful students and staff and I look forward to meeting you at some point in the near future.

Drop off / Pick up

Please can we remind parents/carers that due to the high volume of vehicles, as well as pedestrians within the school site at the beginning and end of the day, that you show courtesy to other drivers and proceed with caution. Parents are welcome to use the drop off and pick up area; please use this area in a similar manner to the "pick up and drop off zone" at Luton Airport (although without the charge!). However, in order to avoid congestion and other safety hazards, we would ask that parents only collect or set down in this area and that it should not be used as a parking zone for anything other than a few moments. The buses have a separate turning circle so there should be no reason for any confusion.

At the end of the day please can we ask parents not to park on the road area between the bus turning circle and the staff car park to ensure that we always have clear access for emergency service vehicles. We have placed cones at the entrance to the staff car park and would respectfully ask that they remain in place and are only removed by our staff.

We would also like to encourage you to park a few minutes' walk from the school, this would assist in increasing and sustaining our students activity levels, as well as reducing congestion in the immediate locality of the school and on site.

Character Theme For Next Week: Developing Your Skills, including Social Skills

We continue our assemblies linking to activities week for years 7 – 9 and work experience for year 10 and 12, which will take place $17^{th} - 21^{st}$ July 2023. Our discussions are about trying new things, improving current skills and most importantly, developing those character and social skills. Whilst we immediately think of stickability and self-regulation, we want students to consider teamwork, leadership – and actually empathy, kindness and communication skills. Characters of the Week: The Pallbearers from the 1st Battalion Grenadier Guards



The pallbearers hail from the Queen's Company, the 1st Battalion Grenadier Guards. 'It's their role to protect her body, both in life and in death, remaining in the Queen's Company until King Charles decides otherwise,' explained Major Adrian Weale. The guards are famous for their rare double role in the army: they have both a public ceremonial duty towards the monarch, as well as an operational one in Light Role Infantry around the world. Indeed, the unit was on the ground in Iraq at the time of the Queen's death, and was recalled at once to fulfill its traditional duty.



The lead-lined oak coffin weighed over 500lb, and that's before the Royal Standard was draped upon it, along with the bouquet, Imperial State Crown, and orb and sceptre, which were luckily fastened on top. They lifted it on their shoulders, with nerves of steel.

All have been through a rigorous training process. Recruits to the Guards have to undergo a thirty-week training programme at the Infantry Training Centre, two weeks more than the regular training in order to prepare for drills and

ceremonies like these, even before the funeral rehearsals.

Various soldiers across Britain have had some part in carrying the coffin from Balmoral, including eight from the Royal Regiment of Scotland. The task in Westminster Abbey and St George's Chapel yesterday, which involved navigating around the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in the Abbey, and carrying the coffin up three flights of stairs in the Chapel, before King and country, was the greatest by far.


Last weeks Answer:
