## A Note from the Deputy Headteacher

As you may be aware, we have made a few adjustments to how recognition points and sanctions are recorded on SIMS (our Information Management System) and I would like to take this opportunity to outline a few important points, including how you can stay up to date with your child's progress at school.

Just before I do this however, between $1^{\text {st }}$ September 2022 and $6^{\text {th }}$ February 2023, staff at Kings Langley School have issued 5.9 recognition points for every 1 sanction (approximate ratio of $6: 1$ ) with a total of 38,615 recognition points being issued to students. This shows that not only are staff placing the positive elements above sanctions, but more importantly, it proves how well Kings Langley students embody the core character traits of stickability, empathy and self-regulation.

This will provide you with live updates every time your child receives a recognition point or sanction as well as their timetable and other useful information. A step by step guide and an invitation was sent out to all parents not currently using the app in January.

We receive many phone calls and emails from parents asking questions about some of the processes in place at Kings Langley School, so the following information covers the relevant details we get asked about regularly.

When students are tardy (late for no valid reason) to lessons, they are issued a tardiness detention the following day, equating to the total number of minutes they were late to lessons the previous day. The tardiness detentions are held at break time in F101 and F102. Students know when they have a tardiness detention as they are told by their subject teacher that they are late as they enter the classroom. They are also reminded by their Form tutor on the morning of the detention that they have a tardiness detention that break time. If a student does not attend form time and therefore is not informed of their tardiness detention, they should already be aware of it but can also report to F101 and F102 at the start of break to check with the staff on break time detention duty just to be sure.

When students attend their tardiness detention, their name is removed from the list. However, if a student fails to attend their tardiness detention, they then receive a 30 minute after school detention the following day. This shows on the SIMS Parent App as 'Red Card - missed break det. 30min'. If they attend this, again, their name is removed from the list. However, if a student fails to attend this detention, a 60 minute detention is issued for the following day and this shows on the SIMS Parent App as 'Red Card - missed after sch. Det. $60 \mathrm{~min}^{\prime}$. We all appreciate the importance of punctuality, it is a vital life skill. Instilling the value of punctuality can help develop your child into a more disciplined person, as they understand and appreciate the value of time. This behaves as a catalyst to make other positive changes in their life and helps to combat any form of laziness and negative behaviour from a young age. I would like to report that between $1^{\text {st }}$ September 2022 and $6^{\text {th }}$ February 2023, 452 students were on time to every lesson and therefore received not one tardiness minute. This is what every student should aspire to.

With regard to the specific lesson that the student was late for, the students know this information as they were informed by the teacher as they entered the classroom. As a result, if you have any questions relating to a tardiness detention being issued to your child, please ask your child.

If, after conversation with your child there are still remaining questions, please contact the specific subject teacher in question. The office staff are not aware of the details and therefore are not in a position to answer your questions, so please do not call them.

If a student truants class, a 60 minute detention is issued for the following day and this shows on the SIMS Parent App as 'Red Card - truancy 60min'. We want students to attend every lesson on time in order to maximise their learning time and increase their future chances of success.

During lessons, if students are not conducting themselves in a way that is conducive to learning, an 'inform, warn, red card' may be issued. To explain this further, if a student exhibits a behaviour that is preventing them (or others) from learning, the teacher 'informs' them that they need to stop. If the student continues to act in an inappropriate way then they are 'warned' that further negative behaviour will lead to a Red Card. Therefore, for a Red Card to be issued, a student is given two opportunities to positively amend their behaviour before any sanction is given.

In the unfortunate circumstance when a Red Card is issued, this can take the form of a 'Red Card - removal (disruption) 30 min ', or a 'Red Card - defiance (stay in class) 30min'. If you have any questions relating to a Red Card, please ask your child or refer to the SIMS Parent App. On the SIMS Parent App, the subject, lesson code, week, day and period appear e.g. (French-7D/Fr-2TUE:6). The same information is also shown when recognition points are awarded, thus giving you all of the information you require. If you have any outstanding questions, please direct these to the subject teacher in question via email. As previously stated, the office staff are not aware of any details and therefore are not in a position to answer your questions.

All detentions take place in F101 and F102. Students are aware that they have an after school detention as they were told about the red card issued the previous day, their Form Tutor reminds them dúring registration on the day of detention and their period 6 subject teacher not only reminds them again, but then escorts them to the detention. We want for every student who has been issued with a detention to serve it as soon as possible and then return to school the following morning with a clean slate. Therefore, please encourage your child to go with the teacher and attend their detention if they have one, in order to prevent further escalation and also to give them the fresh start the following morning.


Finally, staff at Kings Langley School do not enjoy issuing sanctions and only do so when absolutely necessary. We much prefer to praise and recognise positive standards of conduct and work demonstrated by students, which is demonstrated by the 38,615 recognition points issued so far. Please encourage your child to work with staff to ensure that they maximise the opportunities afforded to them at school and leave us as the best version of themselves.
