A note from the Headteacher

We come to the end of another academic term at Kings Langley School with much to celebrate within our community. The music department continues to strengthen with more and more opportunities to shine, whether that be in the well attended Chamber Concert, our school band playing at the Horn in St Albans or our students taking part in the Royal Albert Hall concert! In sport we once again see huge successes as either individuals or as teams on the courts and pitches with many finals to be played next half term either in district, county or national cups. I am particularly pleased with our girls' football with a number of teams now succeeding not only in local competitions but also in national cups as well!

We have an ever-growing number of students taking part in Duke of Edinburgh (DofE) expeditions with our students praised for their determination and strength of character by members of the teams supporting them or by various members of the public. I am delighted that next half term we have a large group now participating in the highly prestigious Gold DofE and each year more and more students are taking part in this opportunity.

This term has also seen the growth and drive of our clubs and opportunities programmes with a whopping 92% of our year 7 students involved in a club or opportunity at the school along with over 600 interventions attended and engaged with by our exam cohorts!

I am always amazed when I reflect back on what has been achieved in a half term and my thanks go out to all of our community for either engaging with what we offer fully, and to our staff for putting on such a wide array of opportunities and giving up so much time to support our students to unlock their potential.

Staff Changes

We only have one member of staff leaving us at Easter and that is Mrs Sharp, who is following her passion and moving into a larger senior leader role at a Hertfordshire Special School. Mrs Sharp has been a real driver for the culture I want at the school around her specialism of SENd in particular, and we thank her for her leadership and drive to make this happen. I am sure she will be a real success in her new role at Garston Manor and we wish her the best of luck in this new role.

As part of good succession planning Miss Reeve has been promoted to the role of SENCo and Mr Searle will take SENd into the Deputy Head remit he holds. Miss Reeve has been a strong deputy to Mrs Sharp and brings with her a wealth of experience and real depth in knowledge through her Masters in Autism and the SENCo qualification. Mr Searle has been a previous Deputy Head at a school with over 100 EHCP plans and a wealth of experience of line manging SENd departments. Between them I am confident that they can build on the work of Mrs Sharp.

Next Steps in school development

I am relentless in wanting the best for this school and our community and I will update you early next term on the next steps and developments for September and beyond. However, in order to take the school to the next phase I have requested from Governors a change to the planned start to term in September to allow me to create a longer and more detailed training programme for staff to ensure staff are fully trained on the next phases of the school's development. A note from the Principal Assistant Headteacher - Mr Shaw

At Kings Langley School, we believe that our school uniform plays a key role in fostering a positive and inclusive learning environment. Here are some of the reasons why wearing a uniform is so important:

1. Promotes Equality: A school uniform ensures that all students are dressed in the same way, minimising visible differences between families in terms of clothing. This creates an environment where students are judged on their abilities and character rather than their fashion choices or financial circumstances.

2. Encourages Focus on Education: By removing distractions related to fashion, school uniforms help students focus on what really matters: their learning. Students can engage in their studies without the pressure of keeping up with trends or worrying about what to wear each day.

3. Builds School Identity and Pride: Wearing a uniform fosters a sense of community and belonging among students. It helps build school spirit and pride, encouraging students to feel connected to their school and to one another.

4. Enhances Safety and Security: School uniforms make it easier to identify students, particularly in the event of a safety concern or emergency. It also helps prevent individuals from entering the school premises without being easily identified.

5. Supports Discipline and Professionalism: Uniforms contribute to developing a sense of discipline and professionalism in students. By wearing a uniform, students learn the importance of responsibility and taking pride in their appearance, which can have lasting benefits beyond school life.

We kindly request your support in ensuring that your child wears the appropriate school uniform each day. Our school uniform policy is outlined in the Student Planner as well as on the Kings Langley School Website, but for ease of access, our uniform expectations are outlined in the final pages of this letter, and we encourage you to review it with your child to ensure that they have everything they need.

If students arrive at school without the correct uniform, they will be taken to the Pastoral Office and supported by the Pastoral Team to address the issue, by calling home to see if a parent can drop the item at reception so it can be passed to the student in the first instance. If this is not possible, students will be lent the item of uniform and will change into it so they can then follow their normal timetable of lessons and maximise their learning throughout the day.

The vast majority of our students do wear their uniform with pride and we praise them for this. The following expectations outline specific areas whereby some students fail to wear their uniform correctly. Shirts should always be tucked into the trousers or skirt, top buttons should be fastened and ties done up to the collar, blazers should always be worn (unless permission is granted otherwise), all jumpers should be V-neck so that ties can be seen, skirts should reach the knee and jewellery should match our expectation no necklaces, bracelets, rings or nose-rings and only one small stud in each ear.

Of equal importance is ensuring that students have the necessary equipment for school each day. Being properly equipped is essential for your child to fully engage in their lessons and participate in activities effectively. Having the right tools not only supports their learning but also fosters independence, organisation, and responsibility – skills that are vital for their success both in and outside of the classroom. By ensuring your child has the equipment they need, we can minimise distractions and maximise learning opportunities in the classroom.

To help your child succeed, we kindly ask that they come to school prepared with the items outlined on the following page, every day.

We understand that circumstances can sometimes make it challenging to obtain uniform or equipment items. If this is the case, please do not hesitate to contact the school office in confidence, and we will do our best to provide support.

Thank you for your cooperation and continued support. Your partnership makes a significant difference in making Kings Langley School a place where every student can thrive and fulfil their potential.


School Uniform			
Item	Description	Example	
Blazer	To be worn at all times unless permission has been given by staff to remove it.		
Shirt	Top button done up. Tucked into trousers or skirt.	(P)	
Jumper (optional)	Black plain v neck.	Must be v neck so the tie can be seen.	
Tie	Knot to be pulled tight covering the top button of the shirt. Tie must be worn long enough to reach the top of the trouser or skirt.		
Skirt	Black pleated knee length school skirt. Skirts must be properly fastened and not rolled up.	Must be of correct length,	
Trousers	To be worn at full length. Not tucked into socks. No cargo trousers.	Must be we correctly around waist.	
Shoes	To be worn at all times. They must be black, flat, leather shoes that can be polished with black stitching and black laces. No trainer style shoes.		
Socks/Tights	Ankle socks plain black. No knee high socks. Tights should be plain black or natural.	Black socks only to be worn with skirts.	
Headscarf (where required)	Must be plain black or school maroon.		

Coat	No coat to be worn over or under the school blazer inside the building.





Science News




in the wind!





They play games, scoring points from each other, anything to pass the time until they are free.




Books of the Month

Sixth Form Fiction

The Beautiful and Damned by F. Scott Fitzgerald

2025 is the centennial anniversary of Fitzgerald's classic, *The Great Gatsby*, an A Level English set text.

In *The Beautiful and Damned*, Anthony Patch, the heir to his grandfather's considerable fortune, is led astray from the path to gainful employment by the temptations of the 1920s Jazz Age. His descent into dissolution and profligacy is accelerated by his marriage to the attractive but turbulent Gloria, and the couple soon discover the dangerous flip side of a life of glamour and debauchery.



Sixth Form Non-Fiction

Mastering Composition: The Definitive Guide for Photographers by Richard Garvey-Williams

The definitive guide for taking great photos, considering visual weight, balance, negative space, and depth. Garvey-Williams argues that success lies in a combination of four elements: an impactful subject; dynamic composition; effective use of lighting; and, perhaps the most crucial, an ability to invoke an emotional response in the viewer. The book is illustrated with examples of the author's own beautiful nature photography, along with diagrams and notation to explain techniques clearly.

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
