A note from the Principal Assistant Headteacher - Mrs Butt

The Importance of Culture Capital

“Learning by doing theory is nice, but nothing replaces actual experience.” Tony Hsieh

Whilst the term ‘cultural capital’ may be a recent one in schools, the concept certainly is not and has been the bedrock of most schools for many years now. Ofsted added the term ‘cultural capital’ to its ‘School inspection handbook’ in 2019, which describes “... the essential knowledge that pupils need to be educated citizens, introducing them to the best that has been thought and said and helping to engender an appreciation of human creativity and achievement.”

In 2019, former HMCI Amanda Spielman explained that in practice, “... we simply mean the essential knowledge, those standard reference points, that we want all children to have. So, for example, it’s about being able to learn about and name things that are for many outside their daily experience”.

Cultural capital is important because it equips young people with the knowledge, skills, and behaviours needed to succeed in various aspects of life, including education, social interactions, and career advancement.

It also fosters a broader understanding of the world and encourages engagement with diverse cultures, promoting holistic development and social awareness. Improving cultural capital and providing various opportunities for our young people is at the core of our provision at Kings Langley school and Activities Week has a crucial role in this. One of our aspirations is to reduce and eventually eradicate inequalities. Understanding and valuing cultural capital is essential for creating inclusive and equitable educational environments. This is important to enable our young people, as well as the adults who work with and for them, to flourish, and improve outcomes for all. To ensure our young people can benefit from as many opportunities as possible, we try and keep costs as low as possible and provide help and support for those who need it. We host a range of various activities, some in school and some out of school so all our young people can benefit from a range of skills.



Every September, a plan of possible overnight and day trips are sent out to Key Stage 3 students and parents/ carers who are encouraged to sign up for as many as they wish. These trips require payment, however our aim is to involve all students, so costs are kept to a minimum and support is found for those students where cost could be a limiting factor. In the summer, when students are not out of school on a trip or on their one-day work shadowing, a programme of activities is in place which either builds or broadens on curriculum content or gives students the opportunity to be creative or try/see something new and different.

These are planned as non-chargeable activities and in general are run by the staff based around different expertise such as orienteering, origami, circus skills etc. At the end of each Activities week, students are asked to complete an evaluation form about their experiences and to nominate a student and a teacher that impressed them. These nominations, with explanations, are then returned to the named student or teacher as an act of recognition and kindness which feeds into our rewards and recognition system.

Activities Week is a school event where students engage in a variety of extracurricular activities, often including day trips and residential trips, to broaden their experiences and develop skills outside the classroom. It is a way to provide enrichment opportunities, foster new skills, and promote character development.

Various theatre trips and in Art, Drama and Music events enhance our students' learning and academic success as they can enhance a young person's engagement with subjects like literature, history, music, and art, making learning more meaningful and enriching.

The overseas trips and residential trips improve the social and emotional development of our young people by exposing them to various cultural experiences and knowledge, which nurtures social, emotional, and cultural awareness, contributing to their overall wellbeing.

The different craft opportunities and teamwork events help our young people improve their critical thinking and creativity fostering a broader understanding of the world. These have ranged from baking, artistic endeavours and outdoor sports-based activities.




All pre-orders will be delivered to school, and available to collect from the library either on the day of Catherine's visit, or afterwards. The deadline for orders is June 18th.



The Invention of the Calculator: A Journey Through Time

Are you school ready; do you have your Calculator? Do you just see your calculator as a box of tricks, which you sometimes forget to bring to school? It is time to explore the history of these fantastic time saving devices.

Imagine solving math problems without a calculator. It would be tough, right? Today, calculators help us with everything from simple sums to complex equations. But how did these amazing devices come to be? Let's explore the history of the calculator.

Early Beginnings: The Abacus

The story starts with the abacus, a simple counting device made of beads and rods used by ancient civilisations like the Sumerians, Egyptians, and Chinese. The abacus allowed people to perform basic arithmetic operations and was revolutionary for its time.

The Mechanical Era: Pascal's Calculator

Advancements in Mechanical Calculators




Modern Calculators: From Basic to Advanced

Update on Sponsorship



An enormous thank you to all those parents and students who have sponsored Andrew Bilton (Kings Langley School) and Mike Garvey (St Clement Danes School) who are taking part in an event called Rat Race: The Wall.

This is a famous 26-hour endurance cross country running race from Carlisle to Newcastle, across 70 miles of Hadrian's Wall.

The race starts at 7am on Saturday 14 June - all the preparation training is now done, the two new kilts that they are wearing have been purchased, and both members of staff can be spotted around school looking pale at the thought of the daunting physical challenge ahead!

Members of staff will be present at sections of the course in Northumbria, to offer them tea, encouragement and pain relief.

They are raising money for two amazing charitable causes:

- Breast Cancer – an awful disease, which has affected many people.
- Trikes for Felix and his friends: these are local children with very severe disabilities, all of whom attend a specialist school in Bushey. Felix is 6 years old but has the cognitive ability of 18 months. He is unable to walk, or talk, and needs permanent care round the clock. The trikes are specialist mobile 'bikes' which help the children straighten and strengthen the muscles in their lower limbs, as well as bringing them huge joy. We are hoping to be able to purchase two trikes for the school. Felix's mother Emma was a music teacher at SCD for many years and now teaches at KLS.

To date, we have all managed to raise over £2300 pounds, which is incredible! A large group of students are also doing their own sponsored event (car wash, walk, cake bake, film event etc) over the weekend of the 14 July, each aiming to raise £20 for the final pot tally. Pictures of these individual events will be collated for a special mention in the school newsletter after the event. Any students wishing to join them should see either member of staff.



Typically, you would be mentored alongside one of our existing coaches and help out poolside for a number of weeks to build experience and knowledge. Once you are ready, we would ask you to take the Swim England Assistant Swimming Coach Qualification. The course is a blended learning format and consists of theory, writing a lesson plan and practical assessment.
