


understand the past and these sacrifices and understand what each colour poppy means as they plant them out in our field of remembrance.

Red Poppies - The red poppy is the most famous symbol used to commemorate those who sacrificed their lives in World War One and conflicts that followed.

Wearing a poppy was inspired by the fields of poppies that grew where many

of the battles were fought. The red poppy belongs to the Royal British Legion - a charity created by Veterans of World War One. They say that the red poppy represents remembrance and hope.





Purple Poppies - The purple poppy is often worn to remember animals that have been victims of war. Animals like horses, dogs and pigeons were often drafted into the war effort, and those that wear the purple poppy feel their service should be seen as equal to that of human service.



Caribbean communities

In particular, many horses were killed or injured in World War One. Donations to the Animal Purple Poppy Fund go to charities including World Horse Welfare and the Household Cavalry Foundation. The Animal Purple Poppy Fund uses the word poppy with the agreement of the Royal British Legion.

Black Poppies - The Black Poppy Rose commemorates the contributions of Black African and Black Caribbean communities to the war effort - as servicemen and

servicewomen, and as civilians. The charitable organisation was launched in 2010 and aims to highlight "largely untold historical legacies" from the 16th century onwards.

White Poppies - Some people feel that the red poppy glorifies war and conflict. Instead they might choose to wear a white poppy. The white poppy is handed out by a charity called Peace Pledge Union, which promotes peace. They say that the white poppy commemorates people who died in



conflict, but focuses on achieving peace and challenging the way we look at war.

As you will be aware there are many house competitions throughout the year and this week on Friday the house competition concludes and I know Ms Scanlan has seen many "model items, posters etc to demonstrate the significance of Remembrance Day" as part of this competition. On Remembrance Day we will ensure the Last Post is played and our community can join each other in this special day of remembrance.

Attendance and Punctuality

I am sure that you are all aware of the importance of attendance at school. It is central to raising standards and to ensuring that children fulfil their potential. Missing days at school and even lessons leaves children vulnerable to falling behind and it is a fact that children with poor attendance achieve less both at school and therefore less in later life.

It is a legal duty for parents to ensure that their children attend school regularly and that they are punctual to school. Please read the attendance ladder below which illustrates the importance between attendance and achievement. Please also look at the tables which show the link between outcomes and how outcomes are linked to attendance. It clearly shows that the better the attendance is, the better the outcomes are.

Please also be aware that Pastoral Teams run detentions at break and or lunch for students who arrive late to school or lessons. Clearly if a bus is late then we understand that is not the child's fault and no detention will be given.

Students with attendance of <u>95% or higher</u> were **17 percentage points more likely to achieve 9-5 grades in English and maths** than students with attendance between 90% and 95% (equivalent to ½-1 day off school every fortnight).


Oliver's Great Big Universe by Jorge Cham

What does ADHD tell us about our brains, and how we think and act?




Books of the Month
