## A note from the Deputy Headteacher

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Safeguarding children is one of the most important elements of our job at Kings Langley School and is something we take seriously. While there is a wealth of experience within the school, we are also keen to liaise with relevant external agencies to provide an even better service for our students. So far this half term, we have had presentations by Dan Sarginson on the topic Mental Health and Toxic Masculinity. Last week, Once Chance and the DBA Project visited to provide education on the subject of County Lines. Mental Health and County Lines are both contextual safeguarding areas we have at Kings Langley School and as such our curriculum and extended curriculum educates young people on these areas.

County Lines is where illegal drugs (and also weapons and money) are transported from one area to another, often across police and local authority boundaries (although not exclusively), usually by children or vulnerable people who are coerced into doing so by gangs. The 'County Line' is the mobile phone line used to take the drug orders. Importing areas (places where the drugs are taken) are reporting increased levels of violence and weapon related crimes as a result.

We know via discussions with agencies such as One Chance and our local Police Liaison Officers that County Lines is unfortunately taking place within
 Hertfordshire. Known county lines gangs are known to be operating in Kings Langley, Abbots Langley, Hemel Hempstead and Watford (as well as other surrounding areas).

Sadly, no one is exempt from becoming a victim of County Lines and its associated criminality and exploitation. It doesn't matter about age, gender, race, religion, post code, education status, background, upbringing or family wealth. This is why we wanted to further educate our student body on the subject of County Lines so they have a greater chance of keeping safe and not being drawn in.

One Chance and the DBA Project (Dream, Believe, Achieve) is a collaborative partnership fuelled by a collective commitment to reduce the harm and exploitation of children and young adults, through prevention, early intervention and rehabilitation. The workshops / presentations delivered were interactive, covering proactive and reactive elements, whilst heightening crucial awareness around the subject of County
 Lines. These were all aimed at reducing the number of victims of such crimes. Please talk with your child about the workshops last week and continue to develop their knowledge on this subject. We are pleased to have had emails from parents commending the approach we are taking and feedback is always useful on any other areas parents would like us to focus on.

We intend to utilise the Dream, Believe, Achieve, mentoring organisation more regularly in the future to continue to offer support to our students.

Another contemporary contextual safeguarding area in schools is the topic of vaping, and as a result, we have secured an external expert to come in and address our students early in the New Year. This will further enhance the assemblies held last term and our PSHE programme. We are also developing our approach of a new area we have been highlighted to in "snus". Snus has been used by a large number of premier league football players and as such students around the country are now trying this. I share with you a few articles on this matter and of course we will be taking time to discuss this issue with our student body and educating them around the dangers of its use:
