We told the students just to give them a really good go and that is exactly what they did. Exam invigilators complimented the year group and individuals for their conduct and resilience throughout. Well done all!

Library News

October 1st marks the start of this year's 'Banned Books Week' in the United States, celebrating the freedom to read without censorship. Over the past few years, there has been a concerning increase in calls for censorship at UK libraries, with a recent survey showing that one third of UK librarians have been asked to censor or remove books. Having recently updated our KLS Library Policy in line with guidance from the School Library Association and the Chartered Institute of Library and Information Professionals, we wanted to share our school approach to this issue and reassure our community that Kings Langley School students have the freedom to read as widely as they like.

BANNED

Our school library supports students from Year 7 to 13, alongside staff and other community members, across a broad range of age, ability, and life experience. Every student is an individual, with their own interests, maturity, reading ability, and emotional boundaries. As such, there are always going to be books on our shelves that may be upsetting or otherwise unsuitable for some readers, but which should still be available for the benefit of others. We do not prevent students from reading or borrowing any book they are interested in, but the librarian can give advice on choosing the right book and share appropriate warnings with students about challenging material (where this information is available). Within a growing collection of over 8000 books, however, we cannot be aware of every potential issue, and students are always welcome to choose their books without staff input.

When selecting new books for the library we consult reputable reviews, industry experts, and seek recommendations from our staff and students. Our priority is to ensure students have access to a broad, diverse and rich collection of high-quality resources to support their learning and character development. We want to make sure every aspect of our school community sees themselves reflected in the books available, whilst also introducing students to the wider world and building empathy for those living lives unlike their own. We do not knowingly keep any book on our shelves that is discriminatory, offensive, or otherwise in conflict with our values as a school, unless it is of educational use. For example, our students need access to a variety of views on controversial subjects in history and politics, such as the British Empire.



Books generally marketed to adults are shelved separately, in our Sixth Form section, but are still available to lower school students by request. For example, Jane Austen is primarily read by our A Level English students, but we would certainly never want to prevent a keen reader from enjoying *Pride and Prejudice* at a young age! The only resources we do restrict by age are DVDs, for which we use the ratings given by the British Board of Film Classification – this is a legal requirement, so we cannot lend DVDs to students below the age listed, even with parental consent.

If you have any concerns about your child's reading, it is best to discuss it with them directly. Talking about their reading with you will also help develop their literacy and oracy skills! 
The school continues to develop girls' netball, with practice sessions after school every Friday for Years 7-9 inclusive.

Sports Awards Evening

Our annual Sports Awards evening was held last week to celebrate the numerous student sporting achievements over the last twelve months. It was a fantastic evening, and one in which we were able to personally thank all our students for their commitment and efforts.

We were joined by Mrs Judy Hashman as our special guest.

Mrs Hashman is a former American/English badminton player who won more major international titles than any other player of her era.

Competing in the 1950s and 1960s, she remains the most successful female player in the All England Open Badminton Championships, winning a record 10 singles and 7 doubles titles. She also won 31 titles in the US Open Championships, plus numerous other titles across the world. She led the USA teams that won three successive world team championships. She has appeared as a castaway on the BBC Radio programme Desert Island Discs and featured in the Guinness Book of World Records in the 1970s. She has been inducted into the International Badminton Hall of Fame, the US Badminton Hall of Fame, the International Women's Sports Hall of Fame. Mrs Hashman's speech was truly inspirational and her wise words were something we will remember for a very long time.















