### Introduction

Welcome back to term 3 of the academic year. We hope that the end of term two-week break enabled our students to recharge and refresh themselves for what is now an important time for all students in the Sixth Form. For our Yr13 students, the upcoming terminal exams have already commenced with practical exams and the written examinations starting in the very near future. For Yr12, the end of year examinations will be taking place and therefore the coming weeks will be an important period of time to get prepared and get good revision habits in place.

This term is an important one for the Sixth Form team as we look to refine our provision in preparation for September 2024 and therefore we look to our students, people at home, staff, and wider community. We love to get feedback, both suggestions for improvement and also, it is lovely to hear when we are doing things right too. ### **Newly introduced Sixth Form Cafe**

Opening up for the first day of the new term, our new catering contractors installed a new café facility in the Sixth Form building named Redemption Roasters. This eagerly anticipated facility of the new Sixth Form build provides our Sixth Form students with a dedicated a food and beverage service. The new contractors are keen to provide a service that satisfies the needs and desires of the students and therefore it will be refined and continue to improve as they get to know us. This is one of the developments that we have been eager to introduce into the Sixth Form and we hope that our students enjoy this facility.

### **End of Yr12 Examinations**

The end of Yr12 exams are a vital and important point of assessment. The examinations provide an opportunity for students to present their knowledge and learning for each of their A-Level subjects alongside practising the A-Level examination process.

It is important that students and people at home recognise the significance of the end of year examinations as they do have an impact on what takes place in Yr13 as well as the grades being used as a strong indication of UCAS grades and apprenticeship applications. Both subject leaders and the Sixth Form team also use the results of these exams to identify any specific intervention is required which may require academic monitoring programmes\* to be applied.

We are aware of that for some students, sitting examinations is an overwhelming feeling and that stress levels can increase. This year, we are putting in place an examination process that recognises this and we aim to reduce the negative impacts that sitting examinations can have. We also need to highlight to students that not all stress is bad. Good stress levels can drive productivity, creativity and feed aspirations and hopes for good results. Some forms of stress however need to be paid attention to and the starting point is self-care. Students in Yr12 received a self-care and exam preparation workshop from the NHS Mental Health Team before the end of last term.

Study leave is only given to students in Yr13 before their final examinations. The rationale for this is that many students also complete A-Levels which have a high (or in some cases, completely) NEA (Non-Examination Assessment) meaning that students need to be attending Sixth Form to complete this work. There is also a lot of content that needs to be delivered at A-Level and study leave in Yr12 would make covering the specification content more challenging.

We are introducing increased periods of revision during registration periods and introducing extended hours for silent study in the Sixth Form building and library to ensure that our students can utilise their time outside of taught lessons to effectively prepare and revise for their examinations.

\*Academic monitoring programmes involve students having specific targets set for a period of time, during which subject teacher and/or the KS5 Curriculum Leader monitoring progress against these targets at regular review meetings. Individual support and intervention will feature as part of these programmes. Students should also be aware that off-site, self-supported study may be temporarily removed as part of this support programme, with compulsory study sessions introduced on site.

For the end of Yr12 examinations, there will be a results day where all students receive the results of all their subject examinations. This event will also provide information and support from the Sixth Form team to support students who may need to discuss their results and post-18 destination intentions. It is also a fantastic opportunity to recognise and celebrate the successes that we are sure students will deserve, following the examination period.

### Standards & Expectations

The Sixth Form handbook outlines the standards and expectations of students studying at Kings Langley Sixth Form. As a Sixth Form we wish to draw attention to specific aspects of this to remind students of what we expect them to display on a daily basis.

We wish to give students a mature and adult environment to study and socialise in however, our standards and expectation ensure equality and a culture of mutual respect. Please see the consequences section of the Sixth Form Handbook (pages 31-33) for clarity of actions taken if required.

- 1. **Dress code**—we have a dress code which went through a lot of consultation with staff, students and people at home. We believe that it provides a balance of personal expression and professional attire. Students should be dressed in a manner which is suitable for a Sixth Form and school environment and adheres to this code. We are noticing that a small minority of students are pushing the boundaries of interpretation. We politely ask students and people at home to be aware of the dress code. We appreciate the inconvenience of having to return home to change attire or having to have a change brought into Sixth Form however, students will be asked to rectify attire if it does not meet standards and expectations. Repeated occurrences may mean off-site, self-support study is revoked.
- 2. **Mobile phones and headphones**—we have a very clear policy of zero phones or headphones in the main school building. Students should not be using these items unless part of a directed activity led by the classroom teacher. We do not wish to put students (or staff) in the embarrassing position of having these items confiscated however, it will be done so if required.
- 3. **Subject folders**—it is an expectation that all students have their subject folders for **every lesson** for that day. These folders are a crucial element of the student accountability and responsibility for learning. There are lockers available for students.
- 4. **Attendance & Punctuality**—Students are expected to attend Sixth Form by 8.40am daily and attend their lessons on time. We have our lesson changeover bells set a few minutes early in the Sixth Form building so that students can get to the main building for their lessons on time. Now that we have our café facility in the main building, the excuse of 'lunch queues' are not a reason for poor punctuality. We promote 'accountability and responsibility' in our students for their attendance and punctuality to lessons.
- 5. **Role models**—We expect our students to be mature, polite, courteous young adults who role model the character education we promote as a wider community. We expect our Sixth Form students to role model this to the lower years by speaking to each other, to staff, and to our visitors in a manner that society requires. We also expect our Sixth Formers to assist the school community in upholding the high standards or behaviour and conduct by not only displaying these expectations in themselves, but also challenging where appropriate, the actions and behaviours of younger students.

At Kings Langley Sixth Form believe in encouraging our students to be mature, respectable, young adults. We want to promote an environment and culture of 'expectations' rather than having a long list of rules and 'you must not' however, it is important that we set the standards of expectation through a student code of conduct (pages 29 & 30 of the Sixth Form Handbook).

In the unfortunate position where these expectations are not met, we will enforce the consequences process and respectfully ask students and people at home to understanding of the reasons for this.





### **Student Voice**

Each month students across both Yr12 and Y13 complete a pulse-check containing five questions relating to the Sixth Form provision. This is an opportunity for students to feedback to the Sixth Form on the provision. Students are asked to provide solution focussed suggestions for improvement which is then considered by the Sixth Form team and where possible, changes are then introduced.



The results for the March pulse-check are provided below:

#### Q1: I have everything I need to success in my A-Level

95% (Seriously agree or agree), 5% (disagree or seriously disagree)

Q2: I receive everything I need to be safe, happy and enjoy Sixth Form

98.7% (Seriously agree or agree), 1.3% (disagree or seriously disagree)

Q3: I feel informed about the Sixth Form and receive all the information I need

92.5% (Seriously agree or agree), 7.5% (disagree or seriously disagree)

Q4: I am happy studying at Kings Langley Sixth Form

90% (Seriously agree or agree), 10% (disagree or seriously disagree)

Q5: The Sixth Form consider wellbeing and mental health as an important area

96.3% (Seriously agree or agree), 3.7% (disagree or seriously disagree)

#### Improvements currently being planned/introduced in response to March Pulse-Check:

- Increased examination revision and preparation with consistency across subject areas
- Increased information about university and apprenticeships
- Form tutor / registration notices to also be added to MSTeams
- Silent study periods in the Sixth Form building to be introduced

Where possible, we take on board suggestions and feedback from students and act on these. It isn't however, always possible to make changes due to statutory reasons or because it does not complement the strategic direction of the Sixth Form. We ask our students and people at home to be mindful of this.

Please also be advised that the Sixth Form is not medically qualified and whilst we make improvements to our provision to support positive mental health and wellbeing, if students have medical concerns, they should contact their GP in the first instance.




## **Books of the Month**

Year 12 End-Of-Year Examinations: 13th-24th May 2024

**Dear Parents and Students** 

As shared in the school calendar, this year's Year 12 end-of-year examinations will take place later this term, from Monday 13th May to Friday 24th May 2024. Please find attached the timetable of exams and an overview document providing details, for each subject, of the content being assessed, the format of the exam(s) and suggested revision strategies. All exams will take place in classrooms during lessons, with regular timetabled lessons occurring as normal around the exams. Students recognised by the Learning Support Department as requiring additional time or support will have this allocated to them in class.

These exams will give students the opportunity to test themselves on the knowledge and skills they have learnt up to this point, providing students, parents and teachers with an indication of the grades they are currently working at. They will also inform teaching and learning, and enable areas of the course to be identified in which students need to improve as they progress into Year 13. Students' performance will be discussed with them in lessons following their exams and will be reported formally to parents in the school report that is due to go out at the end of the year. To be able to perform at their best in the exams, students will need to engage with revision in line with the advice given to them in lessons by their class teachers and shared on the attached exam overview sheet.
