

A classic adventure, first published in 1872, heavily influenced by the technology and sociopolitics of the time.

Heat and Dust by Ruth Prawer Jhabvala

The story of a woman seeking to find out more about her stepgrandmother's tumultuous life in 1920s British India.

A classic novella, published in 1899, exploring themes of power and morality in colonial Africa.

A Grain of Wheat by Ngũgĩ wa Thiong'o

A classic of Kenyan literature, this book follows characters whose intertwined lives are transformed by the 1952-1960 Emergency in Kenya.

King Solomon's Mines by H. Rider Haggard

This 1885 adventure story started a wave of books inspired by the exploits of British explorers in Africa.


Kim by Rudyard Kipling





The New Age of Empire by Kehinde Andrews

A study of the legacy of Empire, and its impact on racism and colonialism in the world today.

Empireland and **Stolen History** by Sathnam Sanghera

Where can we see Britain's imperial past today? Sanghera argues it is all around us, and still influences our lives and attitudes.

Victoria's Wars by Saul David

White Debt by T. Harding


When the author discovered that his family had profited from slavery, his investigation took him to Demerara (now Guyana), the site of an uprising that contributed towards eventual abolition.


Black and British by David Olusoga

A comprehensive history of Black Britain, from the Roman Empire to the World Wars.







King Leopold's Ghost by Adam Hochschild
