This landmark book lifted the lid on how globalization was hurting those it was meant to help, and this edition examines our current political and economic ailments.



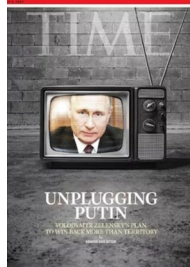
Prisoners of Geography by Tim Marshall

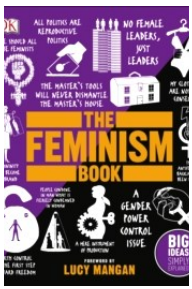
How To Make The World Add Up by Tim Harford

What should we do when someone makes a claim that they say is based on hard data? This book discusses the factors we need to consider.



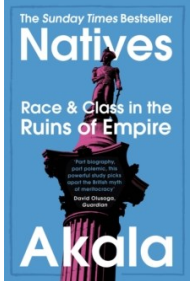
Fake Law by The Secret Barrister

Did an illegal immigrant avoid deportation because he had a cat? How does our ignorance of the law affect our lives?



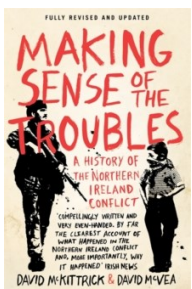
The Feminism Book by Author

A clear and accessible but still highly detailed guide to the Feminist movement, from its beginnings to the present day.



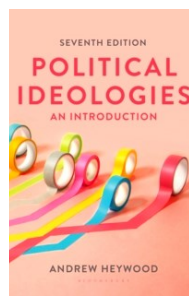
Natives by Akala

Covering everything from the police to education this book confronts the legacy of the British Empire, beginning with the author's own experiences.



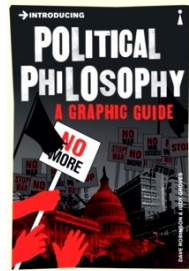
Making Sense of the Troubles: a History of the Northern Ireland Conflict by McKittrick & McVea

A detailed and empathetic history of this violent conflict, from 1921 to the present day.



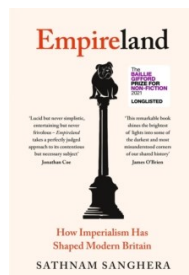
Political Ideologies by Heywood

A key textbook, offering a sweeping survey of the political ideologies that have shaped our world.



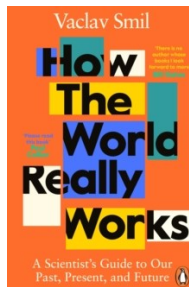
Political Philosophy: A Graphic Guide by Dave Robinson

How did governments get started? Why should they be obeyed? Could we live without them? How much power should they have? Is freedom a right? Which is the best form?



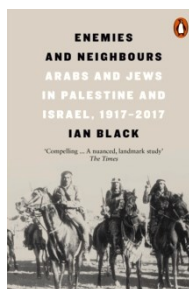
Empireland by S. Sanghera

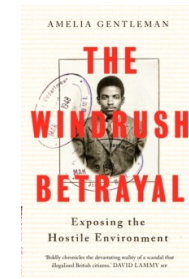

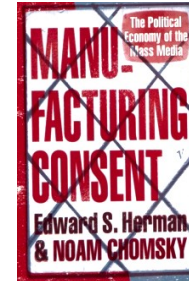
