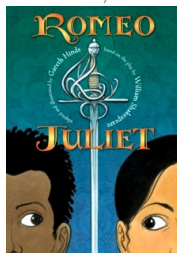
**The Twelfth Day of July** by Joan Lingard

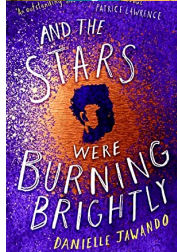
**The Sun is Also a Star** by Nicola Yoon

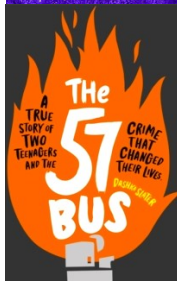
**Romeo and Juliet** graphic novel by Gareth Hinds

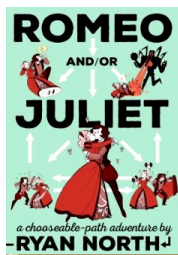
**The 57 Bus** by Dashka Slater

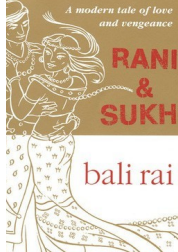
**The Fault in Our Stars** by John Green

**Romeo and/or Juliet** by Ryan North

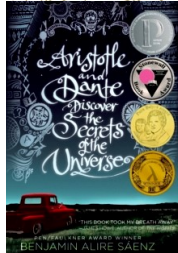

**Rani & Sukh** by Bali Rai

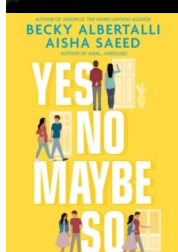
1950s Punjab - a secret affair goes terribly wrong and the bride dies by suicide after her lover is attacked by her family.

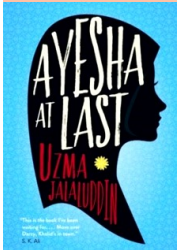


**When Dimple Met Rishi** by Sandhya Menon

***Pride and Prejudice*** by Jane Austen

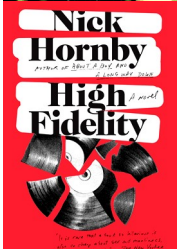

***Sonnets*** by William Shakespeare

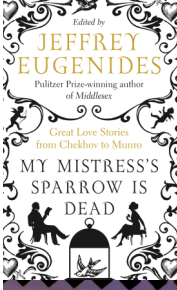

***High Fidelity*** by Nick Hornby

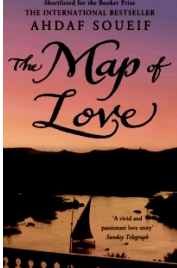

***My Mistress's Sparrow is Dead: Great Love Stories***

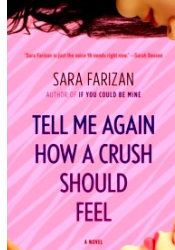
Edited by award-winning author Jeffrey Eugenides, this is a varied and unorthodox anthology of love stories from throughout the history of literature, including both classic and new authors.

***The Map of Love*** by Ahdaf Soueif

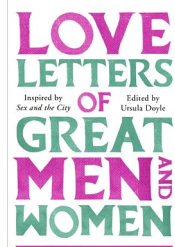

***Manga Romeo and Juliet*** illustrated by Sonia Leong

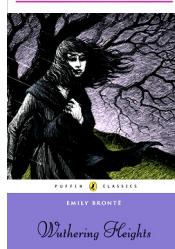

***Tell Me Again How A Crush Should Feel*** by Sara Farizan

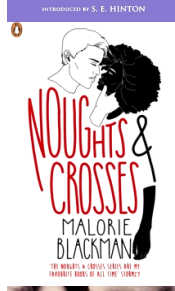

***Love Letters of Great Men and Women*** ed. by U. Doyle

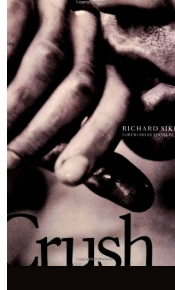
A collection of love letters from a vast array of writers, from Jane Austen to Henry VIII, and Nelson to Mozart. These romantic missives run the gamut from passion and danger to security and warmth, revealing the secret hopes and dreams of famous lovers.

***Wuthering Heights*** by Emily Bronte

Wuthering Heights is a wild, passionate story of the intense and almost demonic love between Catherine and Heathcliff. Wrongly believing that his love for Catherine is not reciprocated, Heathcliff leaves, only to return years later as a wealthy man.

***Noughts and Crosses*** by Malorie Blackman

Sephy is a Cross: she lives a life of privilege and power. But she's lonely, and angry at the world she sees around her. Callum is a nought: less than nothing, there to serve Crosses - but he dreams of a better life. They've been friends since they were children, and they both know that's as far as it can ever go.

***Crush*** by Richard Siken

Fuelled by obsessive, all-consuming love and lust, the poems in *Crush* are fast-paced and modern, with queer characters and themes. Inspired in part by the death of his boyfriend, the poems are often tragic in tone, and feature sex and violence.

***The Handmaid's Tale*** by Margaret Atwood

The Republic of Gilead offers Offred only one function: to breed. If she deviates, she will, like dissenters, be hanged at the wall or sent out to die slowly of radiation sickness. But even a repressive state cannot obliterate desire - neither Offred's nor that of the two men on which her future hangs...
